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Introduction

"While Indian South Africans are just over a hundred years old, they trace their roots in India to one of the oldest known world civilizations, that of the Indus valley."¹

The S.S. Truro, on the 16 November 1860 brought to Durban the first Indians to arrive in Natal, numbering three hundred and forty one. The Truro departed from Madras and the voyage took thirty four days. Aboard the Truro were two hundred and three males, fifty seven women, nineteen girls, twenty one boys, ten infants (including one birth).

"This was the start of a new epoch in Natal and from that early beginning has grown the large population which now has its roots firmly embedded in South Africa."²

Reasons for Indian Labour

The majority of Indian South Africans, are the descendants of indentured workers brought to Natal between 1860 and 1911 to develop the country's sugar belt.

In 1851 the first Sugar Industry was established by Edward Morewood on the Natal North coast. Around this time Mauritius was recruiting labour from India. Officials in Natal hoped for a similar system since there was a shortage of labour. In order for the Sugar Industry to prosper the

needed a stable labour force. After negotiations between the British government and the Indian government, labourers were obtained from India.

Law 14 of 1859 was passed which provided that the government could introduce labour from India and that, individuals could also obtain labour from India.

Conditions laid down by British Government

1. Any Indian who came out as an indentured labourer would have to work for five years with the minimum wage of ten shillings per month.
2. It was stipulated that there be a fixed ratio of men to women but this never happened.
3. Accommodation had to be provided by the employer.
4. Medical attention was free.
5. Labourers were required to work fifty four hours per week.
6. After residing in Natal for ten years labourers could obtain a free passage to India but they were not forced to leave. If they did not want to leave or re-indenture the government had to give them land. According to H. Minker this system is likened to that of slavery and perhaps it was because "India prohibited the indenturing of labour to Natal, nine years earlier, because of her disgust with that colony's treatment of Indians."

Place of Origin

Indians came mainly from Calcutta and Madras. People who came from Madras, South of India, were mainly Tamil and Telegu. Since $\frac{2}{3}$ of indentured population came from the South Indian and Telegu speaking people dominated.

Place of Settlement in Natal

The Indians labourers settled on the north coast of Natal because ~~they~~ they worked on the sugar plantations. Later they were consigned to coalfields, railways and wattle plantations. This accounts for their distribution over the entire Province of Natal.

When they completed their indenture and became free, most of those who chose to remain in the colony took to the cultivation of land.

THE LIFE HISTORY OF MY GRANDFATHER

Date of arrival in South Africa

On 14 August 1906, at the age of four my grandfather, Marimuthu landed on South African soil together with his parents.

Reasons for leaving original country

They ventured to South Africa for economic reasons. Their main aim was to earn enough money and go back to India. Marimuthu was brought along since he was the youngest in his family.

Place of origin in India

They originally came from the village of Mannarpaliyair in the district of Salem in India. The district of Salem is still in existence in this present day in the South of India. The family was Tamil speaking Hindus thus we have carried this religion for the past decade or more.

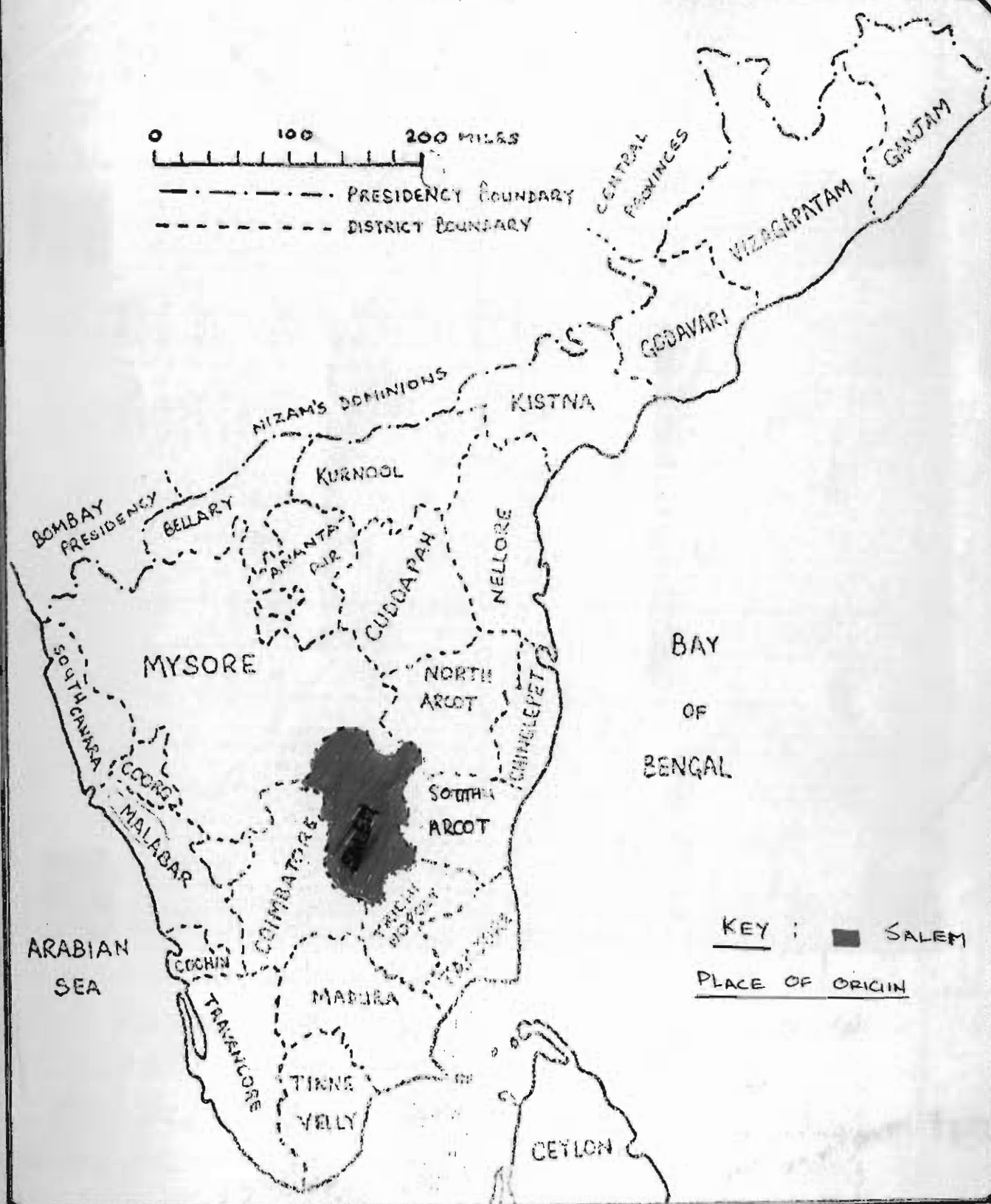
Name of ship and Port of Entry

First place of settlement in Natal

Mammitu and his parents settled in the 'Junction' area presently known as 'Finland'.

Reasons for remaining in South Africa

The family lived in South Africa for seventeen years. In 1923 when his parents were returning to India Mammitu was twenty one years old. He was a member of a soccer team and on that particular day his team was playing. Since he was twenty one years his friends asked him to stay back. He took the plunge to remain. For a short while he corresponded with his parents but later they lost contact.

First Occupation

Before he began working he attended school and achieved a standard five education.

At about the age of twenty he was employed at the Hind Bros. Ltd. He attained the post of supervisor since he was well educated considering the period. At work he was known as Mr. Jack Naicker. He was employed ^{with} ~~at~~ this company until his retirement at the age of sixty five years.

Marriage, children, grandchildren etc

At the age of about thirty years Mammitu

married Gengama (my grandmother)

He accepted her hand in marriage because he was very lonely and he had no family in South Africa

Number of children

Musimutu had six children. The eldest child was born in 1931, that being my father. There are three boys and three girls. My grandfather is succeeded by sixteen grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Date of Death

My grandfather passed away peacefully in the year 1970 at the age of sixty eight. He is loved and remembered by all of us.

OTHER DETAILS

According to the information I obtained from Department of Internal Affairs my grandfather was of Vannia caste.

Vannia

The Vannias were also known as the Vanniyars, who were equivalent to an agricultural caste of Southern India. According to Hutton, the Vannias were spoken of as painters. In modern times Vannias have assumed the title "Mudalayar", used by the chief painters of the Malabar (Tamil) caste in 1680.

Some Vannia also used the title "Padayachee".

or "ladachi". With South Indians of Tamil origin, the surname "Padayachee", "Mudalyar" and "Moodley" are common.

From this information I could not make a link between the Vannia caste and our present family since we carry the surname "Naicker."

CONCLUSION

In conclusion I would like to give my personal opinion of this project. Although it was quite difficult to compile, I personally feel that it was quite an original project. It was very satisfying to ^{both} my family and I because it answered many searching questions that we have wondered about for many, many years.

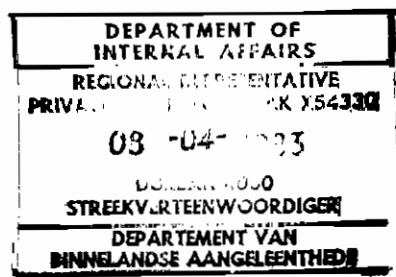
My family and I have benifitted a great deal from this project for we are now much more informed about my grandfather.
